INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE



Choice and challenge in the curriculum through the IB Primary Years Programme (PYP):

At Berkley the New Zealand curriculum is delivered through the framework of the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP).

The PYP focuses on students' academic, social and emotional well being, international-mindedness and the development of strong values. The inquiry based programme is structured into six related, transdisciplinary themes that are explored each year. These themes are selected for their personal and social significance and inspire a coherent, balanced and broad educational experience. Through these six themes learners have the opportunity to develop the knowledge, conceptual understandings, skills and the dispositions they need to be successful in an ever changing world.


These themes are selected for their relevance to people and society. They are described as transdisciplinary because they allow students to transfer new knowledge and understandings across all curriculum areas. Throughout the year, learners are engaged in investigations into important ideas, which require a substantial and high level of involvement and thinking.

Along with the attributes of the Learner Profile, the PYP is made up of four essential elements - knowledge, concepts, approaches to learning (skills) and action.

The six transdisciplinary themes are:

- 1 Who we are:** Inquiry into the nature of the self; beliefs and values; person, physical, mental, social and spiritual health; human relationships including families, friends, communities, and cultures; rights and responsibilities; what it means to be human.
- 2 Where we are in place and time:** Inquiry into orientation in place and time; personal histories; homes and journeys; the discoveries, explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationship between and the interconnectedness of individuals and civilisations, from local and global perspectives.
- 3 How we express ourselves:** Inquiry into the ways in which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values; the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic.
- 4 How the world works:** Inquiry into the natural world and its laws, the interaction between the natural world (physical and biological) and human societies; how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of scientific and technological advances on society and on the environment.
- 5 How we organise ourselves:** Inquiry into the interconnectedness of human-made systems and communities; the structure and function of organisations; societal decision-making; economic activities and their impact on humankind and the environment.
- 6 Sharing the planet:** Inquiry into rights and responsibilities in the struggle to share finite resources with other people and other living things; communities and the relationship within and between them; access to equal opportunities; peace and conflict resolution.



UNIQUENESS OF OUR BERKLEY LEARNING COMMUNITY:

HOW WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE:

Every day 750 rapidly changing 10–14 year olds enrolled at **Berkley Normal Middle School** are making critical and complex life choices.

They are forming attitudes, values and habits of life that will direct their behaviour as adults.

Our Middle School is therefore here to enhance the healthy growth of our young adolescents as lifetime learners who are increasingly competent, self-sufficient young people who are optimistic about their future.



The following conditions and characteristics are strengths at our school:

- Our balanced curriculum is based on the needs of young adolescents.
- Delivery of the New Zealand Curriculum through the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme (PYP).
- Individual needs are acknowledged and reflected in the varied instructional strategies teachers use.
- A full programme is delivered through a blend of homeroom and specialist teaching.
- Experiences with specialist teachers support the transition to future schooling.
- Our evaluation procedures are compatible with the nature of young adolescents. Students reflect upon their achievement relative to their own ability, rather than being in competition for grades and being compared to other students.
- Teachers plan co-operatively and provide a range of extra-curricular learning opportunities that students can choose to participate in.
- This is a time in the emerging adolescent's life when doors are opened and students have a wide range of experiences. By taking up challenges, students are in a strong position to pursue pathways of choice in future learning.

Our middle school environment was specifically created to meet the unique needs of emerging adolescents.

We address these needs in the following ways:

- A strong homeroom system where students spend the majority of their day with one teacher.
- A strong emphasis on the teaching of academic subjects by the homeroom teacher.
- Specialist teaching in Science, Technology, the Arts (visual and performing), Physical Education, Media and Second Language Learning.
- High quality teaching – supported by an intensive research based professional learning programme.
- Regular goal setting and reporting to parents culminating in a full written report at the end of the year.
- Provision of a safe, positive learning environment.
- A two year learning journey alongside a homeroom teacher that allows students to develop high quality one to one relationships.
- Classes carefully constructed to match students with teachers, and students with students.
- Extensive education outside the classroom experiences.
- Regular access to computers and digital devices as a tool for learning.
- An opportunity to develop healthy competition between peers within and across schools.
- A strong promotions programme which provides students with extensive opportunities to engage in actively supervised sporting, cultural and technological activities during break time.
- A rich and diverse programme of engagement in the Performing Arts including opportunities to perform to audiences.



EDUCATION BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Aongatete Camp:

Every even year (2024, 2026...) Berkley students enjoy a camping experience at the Aongatete Outdoor Education Centre (37 kms from Tauranga) in the Kaimai/Mamaku Forest Park. The lodge and its surrounding areas provide our students with an environment full of natural resources and challenges. A tramp over the Kaimai range will begin our four day experience. The programme aims for students to develop their confidence, a sense of adventure, an attitude of responsibility and bush craft skills. Time spent at Aongatete opens student's worlds and increases their awareness of the magnificent resources we have in our backyard and how to safely enjoy them.

New Horizons:

Every odd year (2023, 2025...), our Berkley education outside the classroom programme provides an exciting set of opportunities, known as New Horizons.

Instead of going on a "camping" experience as a class, students select from a very wide range of activities which they participate in for three days. Activities as diverse as surfing, visual art, welding, cycling, hiking, digital problem solving, cooking, horse riding and movie making.

All of these experiences are an opportunity for students to demonstrate the attributes of the International Baccalaureate Learner Profile.

Hillary Outdoors:

Each year a group of students travel to the Hillary Outdoors Education Centre based at either Tongariro or Great Barrier Island. Here they spend a week experiencing a range of challenging activities, specific to the environment. Information about applying for this experience is available from Term Two.



Sporting Programmes:

Philosophy: we believe that sport, physical activity and play are important for the personal growth and development of our students. Our students are regularly timetabled physical activity in the teaming programme.

Promotions: as an extension of the teaming programme, organised sporting opportunities are held every lunchtime for students to opt into. These are a fantastic opportunity for students to consolidate new sports skills learned in the teaming programme and socialise with their peers.

Excellence through Sport and Culture: student representative teams participate in a wide number of sporting and cultural events against Waikato Intermediate and Middle schools. The programme provides for those students who have exceptional skills and qualities in the sporting and cultural arenas.

AIMS Games: held annually in Tauranga, the Association of Intermediate and Middle School (AIMS) Games is an international sporting competition for our elite athletes. These games give 11, 12 and 13 year olds an opportunity to compete as an individual or in a team against the best of their age in a variety of different sports. Each of the sports offered is hosted in superb facilities. The aim of the event is to provide opportunities for the student in the middle years to compete at an elite level, be active, celebrate fair play and enjoy success.

Sports Camp: year 7 and 8 students have the opportunity of being involved in a week-long competition where they compete in a multitude of sports. A heavy focus on the athletes learning journey is prioritised in the build up and during competition week.





What is STEAM?

STEAM is a curriculum based on the idea of educating students in five specific disciplines — science, technology, entrepreneurship, the arts, and mathematics — in an interdisciplinary and applied approach.

Rather than teach the five disciplines as separate and discrete subjects, STEAM integrates them into a cohesive learning paradigm based on real-world applications.

Why STEAM?

What separates STEAM from the traditional science and math education is the blended learning environment which shows students how the scientific method can be applied to everyday life. It teaches students computational thinking and focuses on the real world applications of problem solving. At Berkley, we have state of

the art facilities and skilled teachers that provides Year 9 students with outstanding hands-on learning experiences that challenge inquisitive minds, fuel innovative thinking and create a culture of teamwork and collaboration.

The philosophy of STEAM at Berkley is to provide:

- An engaging interdisciplinary approach for Year 9 students that integrates the areas of science, technology, entrepreneurship, arts and mathematics.
- An inquiry-based approach that helps develop critical thinking, creativity and spur innovation and invention. Students are empowered to take control of their own learning, preparing them to be problem solvers in the real world.
- Innovative and enlightening learning experiences that are transformational for both Year 9 students and educators.

Benefits of being a Year 9 at Berkley:

I will have access to a Chromebook that I will use to support my learning - all Year 9 students will have access to a Chromebook provided by the school.

I will have the opportunity to attend a Year 9 Specialist Camp. The philosophy around the Year 9 camp is to increase students confidence, build leadership, and develop strong connections with their peers. The camp's physical location varies from year to year depending on the groups strengths, needs and passions.

I will develop my Entrepreneurial skills. I will learn the concepts of supply and demand, set a budget, plan and run a business, sell a product for return and learn effective money management skills. All proceeds will go towards the funding of the Year 9 shirt for 2023.

I will be coached and mentored by Berkley staff to develop my leadership skills.

I will learn how to engineer - welding with recycled metal will require creativity and resilience. Students will learn the required skills necessary when working with metal and put their problem solving skills to use as they engineer and test their products against a design brief.

I will have an opportunity to be involved in a specialised Year 9 Arts and Technology programme and extended science programme.

I will experience high quality teaching and learning through STEAM where programmes are specifically tailored to students needs and strengths.



E-LEARNING @ BERKLEY:



E-Learning at Berkley Normal Middle School

E-Learning and the development of digital technology skills, knowledge and understanding are a critical component of learning at Berkley.

All Berkley classrooms are equipped with a range of digital devices. We also welcome students bringing their own devices to school to use as a tool for learning. We ask students and parents to visit our school website (www.berkley.school.nz) to find links to our school BYOD documentation and information about our guidelines for the use of devices across the school.



Digital Technologies Programme

Our digital technologies programme aims to teach students how to design their own digital solutions and become creators of, not just users of, digital technologies.

Digital literacy and digital fluency are two concepts used to describe the knowledge and dispositions learners need to acquire in the process of becoming capable and confident users of digital technologies.

- Digital literacy – builds on traditional literacy learning. It involves learning about how to use digital technologies and what to do with them.
- Digital fluency – includes digital literacy but is more than technical proficiency. It includes many social and dispositional skills necessary to use digital technologies wisely, safely, and respectfully. A digitally fluent person can choose when and articulate why a specific digital technology will achieve a particular purpose.

Our DT Programme is designed to deliver the objectives from the new Digital Technologies Curriculum (2020). Students will be offered opportunities to develop these essential understandings:

- Computational thinking – Students will develop an understanding of computer science principles that underlie all digital technologies. They'll learn core programming concepts so that they can become creators of digital technology, not just users.
- Designing and developing digital outcomes – Students will learn how to design quality, fit-for-purpose digital solutions.

To support and consolidate these skills and understandings, students will be offered opportunities to work with technologies such as:

- Coding platforms - eg. Hour of Code, Scratch and Gamefroot (Blockly, Javascript and Python), MaKeyMaKey, Micro:bits, Spheros, Virtual Reality, Augmented Reality, Digital Breakouts, Robotics - eg. Maqueens, bit:bots, and MOVE Mini buggies, Paper circuits, Minecraft Education, Google Workspace - eg. Docs, Slides, Sites, and Forms.

Agenda Book

This book is a regular and important form of communication between home and school. Each day students record their homework tasks and attach any school notices. We seek parent support by requesting your signature which confirms to us that the information has been received and read.

Homework

All 10-14 year olds, regardless of what they say to the contrary, are expected to do 20 minutes homework, a minimum of three times per week. This is not a set amount, but rather in the nature of a challenge "How much can I do?"





School Hours

School begins at 8:45am and finishes at 3:15pm. To ensure that learners are able to make the most of the programme of learning at Berkley, students are to be at school by 8:30am to prepare for the day ahead and are expected to remain at school for the full school day. Students using public transport to and from school need to use timetabled routes that are scheduled outside of school hours.

Absences

All absences must be communicated and explained to the school before 9.00am in the morning. If the absence is for 3 days or more a medical certificate may be requested.

Our preference is for parents to report student absences via our school website homepage absences link or the Berkley app. Alternatively please ring our office line - (07) 856 6537 ext 1 and leave a message.

Our office staff will send a notification text message if your child is absent without an explanation. The school can request support from IAS (Integrated Attendance Services) for unexplained or lengthy explained absences.

Students who arrive at school after 8.45am must report to the student counter at the school office to sign in.



Leave Requests

During the school day, no student may leave the school grounds without staff permission. An explanatory note from parents or caregivers must be presented on each occasion and students must sign out and be collected from the office. It is expected that these occasions will be infrequent.

Requests for periods of leave during term time are to be directed, in writing, to the principal.

Travel To and From School

Our students are expected to maintain school standards by:

- Wearing school uniform correctly from the time they leave home in the morning until they return home at the end of the day.
- Maintaining a high standard of behaviour is expected at all times including on school and city buses.
- Showing courtesy to all members of the public.

Travel by Car

Parents who deliver their child to school by car should use the Mullane Street entrance. We encourage parents to pick up and drop off students on Morrinsville Road.

We seek your co-operation with this request as the Berkley Avenue entrance (including the bus bay turn-around area) must be kept clear at all times.

Cyclist and Pedestrian Safety

Cyclists and pedestrians are expected to know and follow the "Rules of the Road" including using the appropriate crossings.

Regulation cycle helmets are compulsory and students will not be allowed to bring bicycles to school without one.

Cycle stands are available and all bicycles and scooters need to be padlocked.

Homestay Families


We seek homestay families who can provide a friendly, supportive and caring home environment for our students during their time here at Berkley Normal Middle School. We view the homestay experience as an opportunity for students and homestays to share cultures and create memorable experiences together. We want homestays who will care for students as they would their own child or whanau/family member.

We welcome new homestay applications from the school and local community throughout the year. Our international students range from 10 - 14 years of age. Like all young people they need support, not only with the challenge of a new school environment, but also learning English, new customs and adjusting to family life. For some students this is the first time away from family and they can get homesick. With patient and caring support, students quickly adapt to their new life.

Homestay families are also needed each year for 2 weeks in March when we host students from Makuhari Junior High in Japan. Sometimes in term two we welcome students from Thailand into our school and seek homestay families for them. We also have International Students who require a homestay family for a year or more.

If you are interested in becoming a homestay family, the homestay coordinator will arrange a home visit to check on suitability of your home for hosting, as well as police vetting of all household members over 18 years. These are mandatory under 'The Education (Pastoral Care of International Students) Code of Practice. Full details of the Code of Practice can be found on the NZQA website www.nzqa.govt.nz.

Reporting to Parents

Unit of Inquiry, mathematics and writing books are a record of student achievement. These books are a sequence of work samples that provide parents with information about the class programme and their child's growth and development.

We use Google Apps for Education for student learning. This secure cloud-based system utilises the multi-media dimensions and creativity of our students to capture growth and achievement.

Student led conferences are held each year. During these conferences students share their set goals and teachers report to parents on learning and achievement. Parents will receive regular updates about student progress and achievement in relation to the NZ curriculum achievement levels.

Money and Valuables

Money and valuables requiring safekeeping should be placed in a clearly labelled envelope and handed to the classroom teacher, who will follow our "all care but no responsibility" policy. No responsibility will be accepted for money or valuables not handed in.

All personal items, uniform, books and other equipment must be named. All students must respect the property of others and only use it with the owner's permission.

Stationery

To begin the school year students are required to purchase a stationery pack from school that will be sufficient for all core programmes. The school operates a stationery shop in the Learning Centre for sales during the year.

Canteen

Berkley has a canteen which is run by Libelle Group, NZ's leading school food & beverage service provider. They offer a range of freshly made hot and cold packaged items and drinks for students to purchase during break times. A menu is available on our website. Lunch orders should be placed before school - eftpos is available.

UNIFORM

Our Board of Trustees by-law requires our students to wear the regulation uniform in school at all times.

Uniform gives students a sense of belonging and allows all children to be equally well dressed.

All belongings must be named.
